# Remembering Alumni Who have Cared about our Forests and the Environment

#### DAVIDSON: A. GRANT, PhD

(Forest Pathologist, Retired. Canadian Forestry Service, Fredericton, NB and Ottawa, ON)

Born Moncton NB September 23, 1927. Died Ottawa ON December 20, 2010

Peacefully at the Ottawa Hospital, General Campus on Monday, December 20, 2010 at the age of 83. He leaves his wife of 57 years, Barbara (nee Maxwell) and sons Thomas and James.

Grant graduated from the University of New Brunswick with a Bachelor of Science degree (Forestry) in 1948. He completed his Master's and PhD degrees (Forest Pathology) at the University of Toronto in 1951 and 1955 respectively. His career began in Fredericton with the Department of Forestry where he was appointed head of the forest disease investigations laboratory (entomology and pathology) for the Atlantic Provinces in 1957. In 1962, he moved to departmental headquarters in Ottawa as associate coordinator responsible for the forest disease aspects of the national forest insect and disease survey and continued to work there with the Canadian Forestry Service until his retirement in 1983.

#### James Richard "Mack" Williams

Mack Williams had been a member of the Canadian Institute of Forestry for 62 years; since 1949. He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science in Forestry and received his Master of Science, also at Toronto, in 1958. Mack's career spanned many decades with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and its predecessor, the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests. He retired in 1983. During his career, Mack taught soil science to foresters and other field staff involved in reforestation and forest management, worked in land inventory, and finished off in the land use planning section of the Ministry.

He joined the CIF's Southern Ontario Section Council in 1984; and in 1985 became the Section Historian; with a history published in 1991. One of Mack's main contributions to the CIF, and to forestry has been as editor of the Southern Ontario Section's newsletter since 1987. He edited the newsletter for over 23 years and produced over 90 newsletters! The newsletter has been instrumental at portraying Southern Ontario's forest in context of the landscape and the people of Ontario, Canada and the world.

One of Mack's great forestry interests has been his property in the Oro Hills north of Barrie, which he has owned since 1946, and whose open areas he reforested in the late 40s and 50s. His

plantations have now been thinned, some for the fourth time, and Mack has taken great pleasure in seeing 50 foot hydro poles and other products come from trees planted by himself, his siblings and his parents. An equally important forest product is the peace and quiet he felt, going out of the city and past the hectic highway 400, and just being there for the day.

Over the years Mack has received many awards, including Section Member of the Year in 1989, a special award from the section in 1993, the Institutes Tree of Life Award around 1998. Other awards include the White Pine Award of the Huronia Woodland Owners Association, a stewardship award from the Couchiching Conservancy, and the Community Woodland Steward Award from Ontario Forestry Association, mainly related to the forest.

As a grandparent, and over a period of about six years, Mack did some classroom volunteering, which led to his dream for Canada's approximately 16,000 elementary and high schools to each have a school forest, and actually use it in the learning process resulting in future generations having a strong awareness that we are a forest nation, and of the importance of the Canadian forest to each Canadian, and to the entire world.

Mack will be missed by all. Please pass this message along to anyone who knew him.



Ontario Forest Tenure and Timber Pricing Reform Update Ian Dunn

Since the Faculty of Forestry's November 25<sup>th</sup> Tenure Reform Workshop (and a captivating MFC presentation by yours truly) the Ministry of Northern Development Mines and Forestry (MNDMF) has released a revised proposal. Key elements include:

- Support for enhanced Co-operative SFLs over the next 5-7 years as a viable and appropriate tenure reform.
- Limited implementation of Local Forest Management Corporations (LFMCs), which will be evaluated against predefined criteria prior to broader application.
- Maintaining wood supply commitments to existing forestry companies.

## FSC Forest Certification in the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Forest Region

The Eastern Ontario Model Forest in partnership with FSC Canada, the Ontario Forestry Association, Bancroft Minden SFL and SmartWood is offering a one day informative workshop focused on FSC certification in the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Forest Region.


